

Scientific name: Penstemon strictus

Common name(s): Rocky Mountain Penstemon/Beardtongue

Family: Plantaginaceae (Plantain) [formerly Scrophulariaceae]

Native: CO, Southwest

Habitat: Montane, foothills, Pinyon-Juniper, Sagebrush

Rocky Mountain Penstemon is one of the longest-lived and least fussy of the native Penstemons. Its showy blooms are bumble bee and hummingbird magnets. Combine with Evening Primrose (*Oenothera spp.*), Sulfur Flower Buckwheat (*Eriogonum umbellatum*), Engelmann's Daisy (*Engelmannia pinnatifida*), Blanketflower (*Gaillardia aristata*), Indian Paintbrush (*Castilleja spp.*), Globemallow (*Sphaeralcea spp.*), Prince's Plume (*Stanleya pinnata*) or other Penstemons.

Plant type: Evergreen perennial (reseeds) **Elevation:** Native range to 11,000'

USDA Hardiness Zone: 4

Exposure: Full sun, part sun, light shade

Soil: Adaptable; well-drained

Moisture: Moderate, low, dry

Flower color: Blue, blue-violet, purple

Bloom time: Mid-spring to early summer; may rebloom in fall

Mature size (height x width): 15-30" x 1-3'



Propagation: Cold stratify the seeds at 40°F for 3 months. Sow in situ or in cells. Cover the seeds very lightly. OR Sow the seeds outside in the fall. Rocky Mountain Penstemon self-sows prolifically in gardens.
