

Scientific name: *Ratibida columnifera*, *R. columnaris* var. pulcherrima

Common name(s): Prairie Coneflower, Mexican Hat

Family: Asteraceae (Sunflower)

Native: CO, West, Midwest, East

Habitat: Prairie, plains, meadows, foothills, roadsides

This long-blooming, drought-tolerant, easy to grow perennial provides nectar for bees, butterflies and other insects and seeds for birds. Combine with other native perennials like Black-Eyed Susan (*Rudbeckia hirta*), Blanketflower (*Gaillardia aristata*), Butterfly Weed (*Asclepias tuberosa*), Dotted Gayfeather (*Liatris punctata*), Narrow-Leaf Coneflower (*Echinacea angustifolia*), Purple Prairie Clover (*Dalea purpurea*), Hairy Golden Aster (*Heterotheca villosa*) and Prairie Zinnia (*Zinnia grandiflora*).

Plant type: Perennial (short-lived; reseeds)

Elevation: Native range to 9000'

USDA Hardiness Zone: 4

Exposure: Full sun

Soil: Clay, loam, sandy (not fussy; prefers good drainage)

Moisture: Moderate, low, dry, xeric

Flower color: Yellow, orange, brick red, maroon

Bloom time: Summer

Mature size (height x width): 12-30" x 12-18"



Propagation: Easy to grow from seed. Sow seeds outside in fall or cold stratify (moist, 40°F) for 90 days. Sow, cover lightly. Seeds germinate in 8-21 days at 70°F. Seed-grown plants may bloom the first or second year.
